SEMIANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2021 – March 2022 | Zambia

SUMMARY

Thank you for partnering with World Vision to finish the job in Zambia. Together, we are working to reach everyone, everywhere World Vision works in Zambia, with clean water by 2025—reaching 800,000 people. And so far, we have made great progress.

Since October 2020, **the Finish the Job** initiative has helped:

- 269,387 Zambian children and adults access clean water (34% of our five-year goal).
- 424,772 Zambians access dignified sanitation.
- 376,073 people access handwashing facilities at home to support healthy hygiene practices.

Water supply and security

During the first six months of fiscal year 2022*, the second year of the Finish the Job initiative, the World Vision Zambia water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) team continued to equip vulnerable communities, schools, and healthcare facilities with water infrastructure (such as piped-water systems). For example, in our Chongwe East area program (AP), the Mwambashi School lacked adequate WASH facilities, creating barriers for students like 14-year-old Chipego (pictured at right) to attend school. We equipped her school with a new water system, flushable toilets, sink basins, and a shower room for girls to use during their periods. Sanitation and hygiene

Sanitation and hygiene remained a top priority for the Zambia WASH team, continuing efforts to combat the spread of deadly diseases (such as COVID-19) and ensure equal access for girls, women, and people with disabilities. This resulted in the overachievement of these targets (see table below). For example, World Vision's Zambia WASH and Health teams worked together to develop key hygiene messages for <u>Safe Motherhood</u>. <u>Action Groups</u> and staff members of Zambia's Ministry of Health, helping to keep pregnant women, infants, and children under age 5 safe and healthy.



"I've always wanted to join the military, but thought my dreams were far-fetched because I had to miss school every month [because of my period]," said Chipego, 14 (pictured above). "The latrines at school had no privacy [and] I was unable to change my sanitary pad or shower." In FY22, World Vision installed toilets, sinks, and showers at Chipego's school in Chongwe East AP. "The improved facilities have given me so much hope. My friends and I are so grateful," said Chipego.


KEY LEARNING

Partnerships are critical to finishing the job of achieving WASH access for all.

World Vision Zambia is a leader in equipping rural healthcare facilities with clean water and other WASH services. Our aim is for pregnant women and newborns to have good health by having access to quality healthcare services. Since 2012, we have partnered with Golf Fore Africa to provide WASH services in communities, schools, and healthcare facilities. Through our partnership, two healthcare facilities received newly constructed maternity wards in the first half of FY22. By the close of FY22, three additional maternity wards for other healthcare facilities will have clean water.

We also partner with Zambia's Ministry of Education to ensure students have access to WASH services. In FY22, we equipped 10 schools with water points and five schools with sanitation and hygiene facilities, benefiting students like Mary (pictured at right).

PROGRESS TOWARD FINISHING THE JOB



Goal

800,000 people gain access to clean drinking water from FY21 through FY25.

Actual 269,387 people gained access to clean drinking water since October 2020, including 56,113 during the first half of FY22.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

In the second half of FY22, we will continue our efforts toward finishing the job in Zambia so that everyone, everywhere we work, has access to clean water by 2025. We plan to install or rehabilitate 5,000 additional water points in communities, schools, and healthcare facilities. Also, we will continue to prioritize our sanitation and hygiene efforts, helping to prevent the spread of deadly diseases such as COVID-19. Lastly, we will partner with VisionFund to create opportunities for families to obtain loans to construct improved household latrines and/or a household water supply system.


